

COMMUNITY HOMELESSNESS REPORT SUMMARY

Durham Region

2022-2023

The Community Homelessness Report (CHR) is an annual Reaching Home reporting deliverable that supports communities to prevent and reduce homelessness using a more coordinated, systems-based and data-driven response. The CHR was designed to support local discussions and decision making, using all of the information about homelessness currently available at the community level. Communities are encouraged to use their CHR data to develop clear plans of action that help them to reach their homelessness reduction targets and to leverage the collective efforts of service providers working across the community, regardless of how they are funded.

This is a summary of the CHR for the 2022-23 reporting cycle. It shows the community's self-assessment of Reaching Home implementation, which includes the following key components:

- meaningful collaboration between Indigenous and non-Indigenous partners (see Section 1);
- community-level governance, coordinated service delivery (Coordinated Access) and use of a Homelessness Management Information System or HMIS (see Section 2); and,
- an outcomes-based approach (tracking community-level outcomes and progress against targets using a Unique

identifier or By-Name List, referred to as a List; see Section 3).

In regards to collaboration over the coming year, We have identified with Durham Advisory Committee on Homelessness (our Community Advisory Board) that this is a priority for 2023/2024 and have solicited a working group to support this important work. Through the Region’s Diversity, Equity and Inclusion team we will create a comprehensive plan to build relationships with Indigenous organizations with the goal of better supporting Indigenous communities within Durham Region.

Communication has been made to other Indigenous organizations within the community looking for The Durham Advisory Committee on Homelessness representation and collaboration on partnership opportunities. Although Durham does not have Indigenous organizations on The Durham Advisory Committee on Homelessness, the community has an Indigenous street outreach worker who engages with the homelessness community in Durham region as well as Indigenous sub projects that are funded through alternative funding sources such as the Homelessness Prevention Program.

Our community continues to seek support in regards to strengthening relationship, and engaging with Indigenous partners.

Regular communication to local Indigenous organizations will continue to be made to network with the goal of collaborating in our community in regards to coordinated access and an Homelessness Management Information System.

- Connecting with other communities across the Province and Country to share best practices, research, tips, and learnings about the Coordinated Access System and Homeless Individuals and Families Information System (HIFIS);

- Engaging with OrgCode Consulting Inc. to complete an external review of Durham Region's Coordinated Access and Homelessness Support System;

- Making enhancements to internal changes to the system including System Sector Tables that are organized based on sections of the support system. This continues to allow each sector to implement its own improvement projects and data monitoring.

- Conducting continued Homeless Individuals and Families Information System (HIFIS) training to ensure all agencies are using HIFIS for the List in a consistent manner;
- Using data (e.g., gender, age, acuity levels) from the By-Name List to determine what types of new programs are needed

based on community need and demographic information;

- Use findings and recommendations from OrgCode Consulting Inc.'s Report on Durham's Homelessness Support System to plan further improvements to the system.

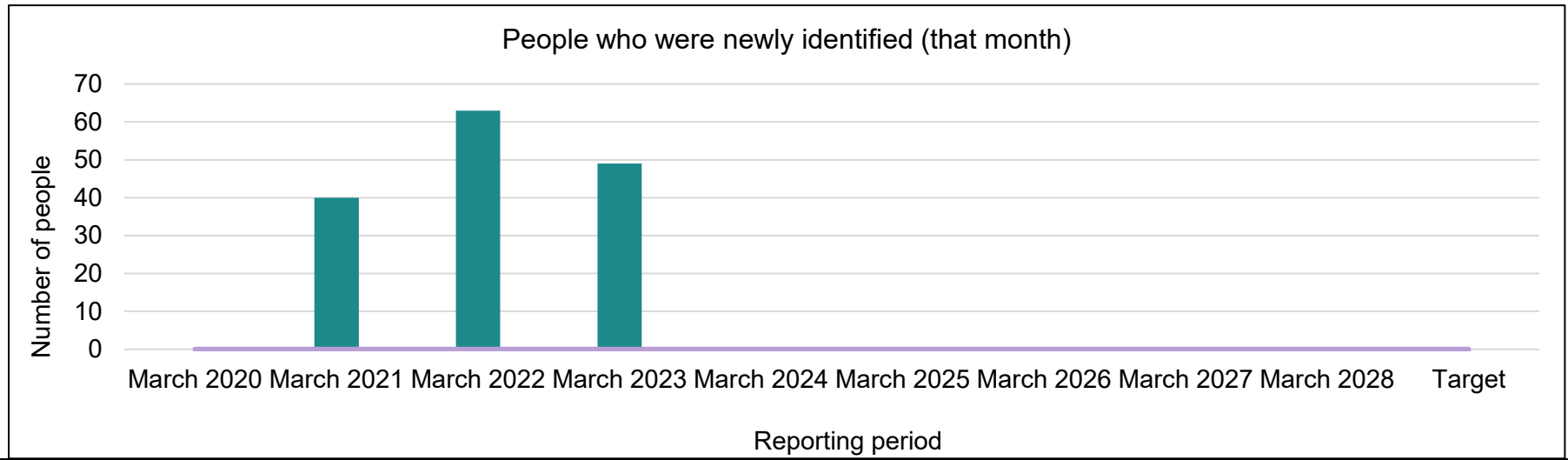

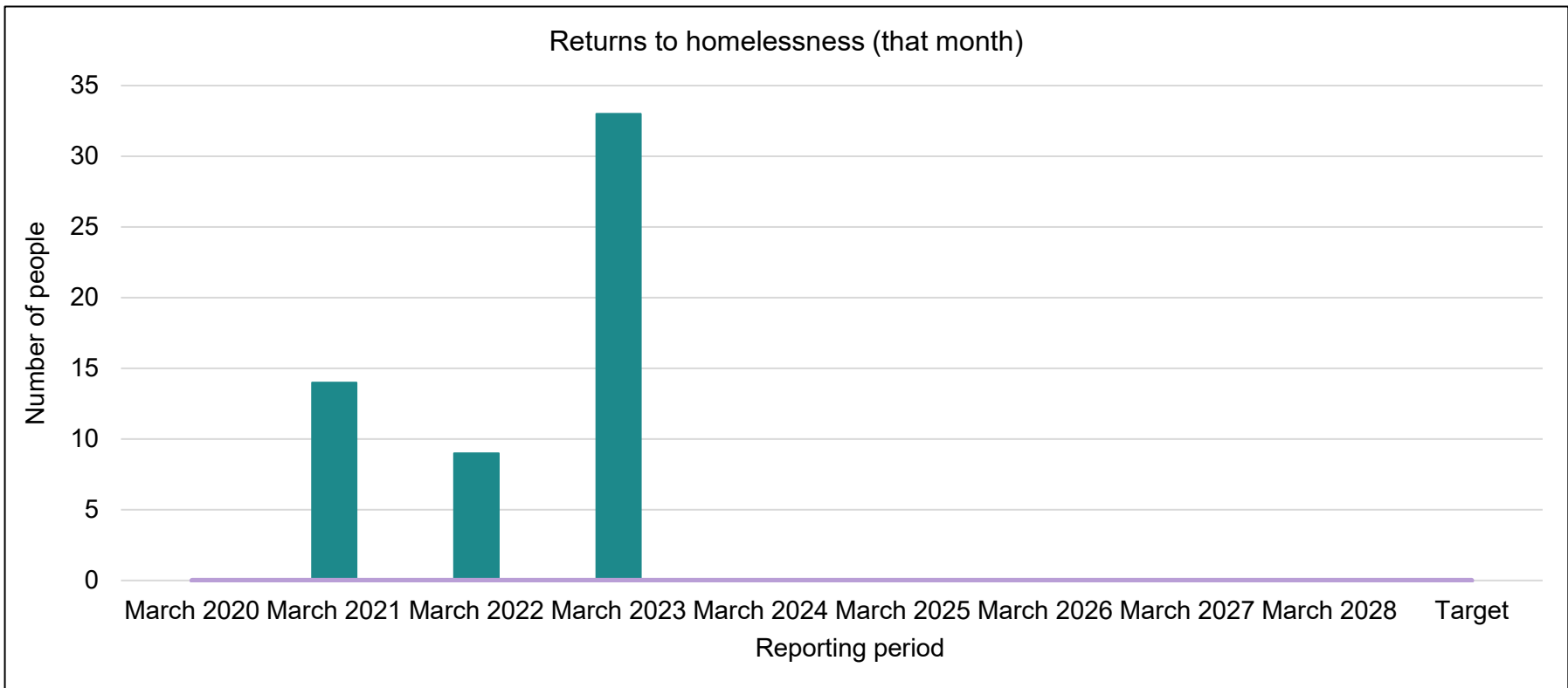

Returns to homelessness includes returns to homelessness from Housed status and returns to homelessness from Inactive status.

We are continuing to improve data by having service providers enter data more regularly - this is resulting in more individuals not staying in "inactive" status and numbers showing as a more accurate discription of the current point in time. We are seeing more people in the community on our By-Name List due to the impacts of rental cost inflation and limited income.
