In comparison to seven of the world's leading economies, Canada has the highest rates of targeted anti-Muslim attacks. A report from the Senate of Canada states that Islamophobia (anti-Muslim discrimination) is a serious and critical problem in Canada, and we must act now to end it. Confronting our own biases and learning more about Islam and Muslims are necessary to support the children, families and communities that we are entrusted with.

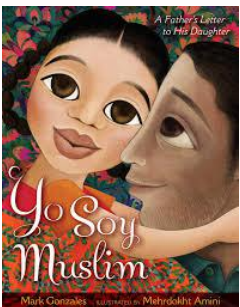

The workshop provides case studies, resources, and recommendations for administrators and educators to support efforts to promote equity and inclusion and to ensure childcare centres remain safe environments for all.

Include books with Muslim characters in your program library. Also, consider ways in which you can naturally embed materials representing Muslim families in your programs.

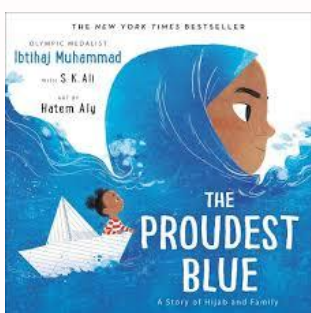
Reflect on your own biases

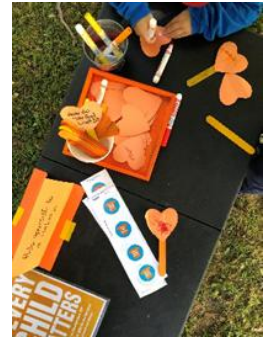


Strengthening our bonds - Indigenous early years learning

Seasonal reflections

The fall season brings us important Indigenous traditional practices. The fall equinox is a meaningful event that honours the harvest season. This year it takes place on September 22. This might mean the harvest of your garden, or the harvest of the efforts and intentions for your life path that you set at the start of the year. Take some time to reflect on this journey.

The National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, also known as Orange Shirt Day, is observed on September 30. This day is intended to commemorate and educate Canadians about the history of Residential Schools, honour the victims, and celebrate the survivors. Consider ways to share these important messages into your early learning environments. Here are a few ideas for inspiration:



Wear orange

All Canadians are called to wear an orange shirt to honour the children who survived the Residential Schools and remember those that did not. The orange shirt serves as a symbol that Every Child Matters.

Heart garden

To honour memories and plant dreams, decorate hearts and tape to sticks. Plant in an outside space, window box or plants pots with soil or plasticine.

Read stories from Indigenous authors

The presence of Indigenous publishers, authors, and illustrators in Canadian children's literature holds the promise that the worldviews and experiences of Indigenous children, families and communities will be honestly represented.

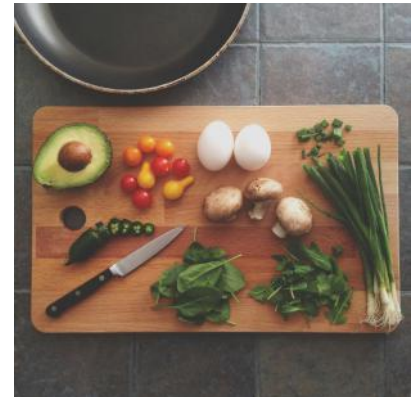

Durham Region Early Learning Home Child Care Initiative

Literacy and Early Learning

Literacy in the early child care sector has so many benefits for the children in child care programs and encourages such meaningful conversations; in turn building a sense of belonging in their programs and community. Along with promoting proficiency in reading, writing and using numbers throughout life, it can also support in obtaining skills in the new world of media, support in mitigating poverty and creating opportunities in later life.

Some strategies that we can bring literacy into different areas of a child care program, or early learning environment can be:

- creating space for children to enjoy, look through and read books (a reading nook, a book bin, books in good condition with minimal missing pages, etc.) allows children the opportunity to develop a respect for books and reading.
- encouraging conversations between children and with children.
- singing throughout the day.
- bringing books into different spaces in your program; outside, among different invitations that are set up, during quiet/rest time, etc.
- introducing young children to the library is so important and can foster their independence and sense of responsibility as they choose their own books and are responsible for caring for them and returning them etc.



Literacy is also a wonderful tool to lean into anti-bias work in the early years. The goal is to create environments that support identity development and a sense of belonging amongst children, so they can reach their full potential.

This five-hour training for early learning supervisors will focus on building positive team environments, addressing components such as the development of trust, forming and sustaining meaningful connections, avoiding dynamics that can lead to negativity and generalized leadership strategies. Ensuring that diversity, equity and inclusion is a regular part of leadership consideration and practices will be discussed. There will be opportunities for small group brainstorming and conversation, and a chance to consider self-reflective and self-care practices for leaders.



QA Corner

The Durham Region Operating Criteria (DROC) outlines clear expectations and guidelines for child care providers who have a Purchase of Service Agreement with Durham Region. The DROC serves as a self-evaluation and planning tool for child care operators and educators to support them on their journey of pedagogical best practices and quality programming. This is a validated tool, created by The City of Toronto and Quality Assurance and Contract Compliance Advisors (QAs) are tested three times per year to ensure they are inter-rater reliable.

Questions During Assessments: The expectation is that the QAs will ask questions when they do not see items to ensure programs are not missing important pieces. To be supportive of your program and respect the importance of educators engaging with the children, the QAs will do their best to balance asking questions at an appropriate time and allowing the space for educators to engage and interact with the children.



Questions have come up as to why we are not asking for as many things as we used to during an assessment. Previously, there was a fairly large number of items that QAs could ask educators to bring out if they had it available in the program and they were observed to be inaccessible. Every year as the tool becomes more familiar, the City of Toronto reduces the number of items QAs can ask for if not observed. Additionally, if one year a QA asks an educator to put out an item during an assessment they will not be asked to do the same for the following year.

Assessment Times: In response to community feedback, the QAs will not start an assessment before 7:30 a.m. unless it is the second day of assessing the same centre and you approve an earlier start time. Most before and after school program assessments require a 7:30 a.m. start to ensure the assessment is completed before the bell time. There may be some circumstances that impact the start time of an assessment.

Leadership Consultations: This year, the QAs will have leadership consultations with the leads and supervisors. This is a reflective conversation to identify where we can best support. Questions will be asked as needed to guide the conversation. This is not a test and there are no wrong answers. We want to meet you where you are at and understand your needs for the program and as the leader. Topics that may be discussed include program successes and milestones, program quality and processes, partnerships and responsive relationships, coaching and mentoring, professional learning and reflection, and wellness. We look forward to chatting and learning from you.

Lastly, The QA team strives to be supportive and develop professional relationships with every site. At the end of each visit, QAs will be asking how they can improve their approach, interactions and overall support of your centre. Honest feedback will help the QA determine how to best meet the needs of your program.

News from the College of Early Childhood Educators



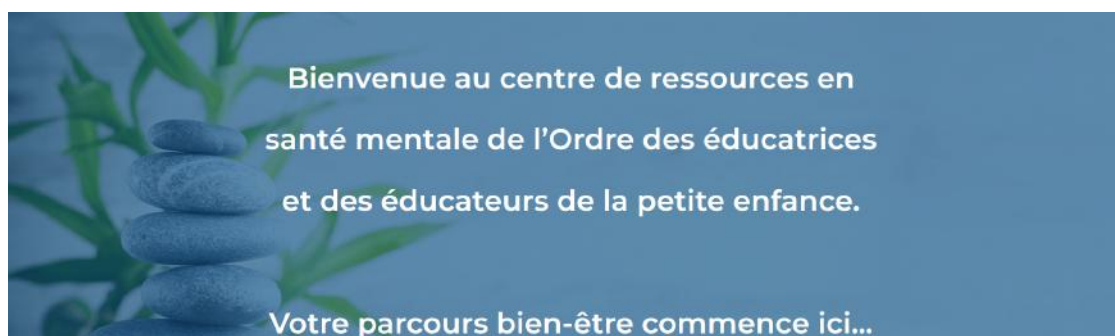
The College has partnered with People Connect to provide self-care and mental health support to all RECEs.

Early Childhood Education and Leadership Grant Programs

Do you qualify for the Ontario Early Childhood Educator Qualification Upgrade Program?



Educators with six months of past or current experience working within a formal early learning program, licensed child care, and unlicensed home child care environment may qualify for financial support for tuition, travel and associated costs to complete an Early Childhood Educator (ECE) diploma (full-time and part-time) at an approved Ontario College for Applied Arts and Technology.

Individuals who identify as Francophone, First Nation, Métis or Inuit are exempt from the required six months work experience if they have a minimum of one day of employment within an eligible agency.

Did you know Ontario offers employed Registered Early Childhood Educators (RECE) leadership education grants in eligible fields of study?

Currently employed Registered Early Childhood Educators with at least two years of experience may qualify for leadership education grants to cover part-time tuition costs in an eligible field of study at a recognized Ontario College for Applied Arts and Technology.

Individuals who identify as Francophone, First Nation, Métis or Inuit are exempt from the required two years of experience if currently employed with an eligible agency.

Eligible fields of study include:

- Pedagogical leadership in Early Childhood Education
- Early Childhood Education administration and management
- Facilities management
- Financial management, responsibility and child care governance
- Human resources, employment standards and labour relations
