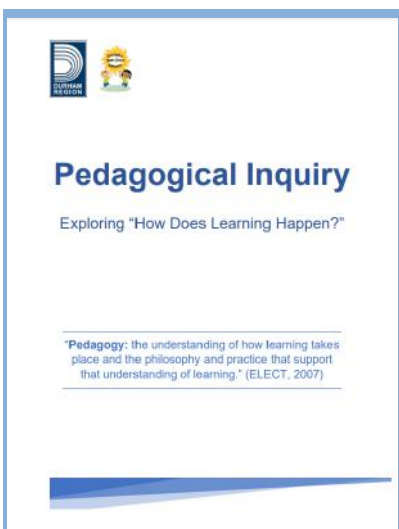


We are excited to announce that our new Resource Library is now open to the public! Visit page 10 for more information and explore all the great materials available to enhance your program.

Bell Let's Talk: **Wednesday January 22, 2025**

A comprehensive national report released by Mental Health Research Canada (MHRC) in October of 2024 demonstrated that there is a growing mental health crisis among young Canadians. As such, Bell announced that it would prioritize youth mental health on Bell Let's Talk Day on January 22, 2025. They will be launching a text-to-donate campaign with 100 per cent of the funds raised going to six youth mental health providers including Integrated Youth Services, Jack.org, Kids Help Phone, National Association of Friendship Centres, Strongest Families Institute and Youth In Mind Foundation

Strengthening our bonds - Indigenous early years learning

Hello! Aaniin!

We are Sacha (Training Specialist, supporting Indigenous programs) and Christine (Early Years Indigenous Cultural Coordinator) and we are thrilled to connect with you for another season. We work in a unique partnership as the Region of Durham and Dnaagdawenmag Binnoojiyag, bringing cultural programming from a Two-Eyed Seeing perspective. This gives us the opportunity to offer meaningful and holistic experiences to the early years community.

Seasonal reflections

The winter season brings us important Indigenous practices as we notice the changes in nature. You may have celebrated the winter solstice, which is when the sun is furthest from the equator and thus, the shortest day of the year, and now are settled into the season. Let's consider some ways to acknowledge the gifts of winter.

Storytelling

Historically, storytelling was a seasonal tradition that was practiced in the winter. Knowledge is one the greatest gifts an Indigenous person can give. The telling of oral traditions requires the storyteller to trust the listener to take away the proper message of the story. Consider ways to share stories in your early learning environment. Try sharing a personal story, a traditional story, a poem or a song.

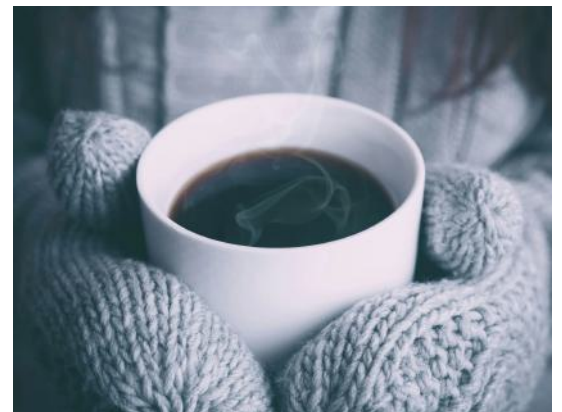
QA Corner

We guarantee you will learn something new every time, just as we always learn something new from you! Before you attend the Intro to DROC session, the online recording of [Foundations of DROC](#) must be viewed. This will provide you with an overview of the assessment process, an explanation of how to read and understand the Durham Region Operating Criteria, the role of the Quality and Compliance Contract Advisor (QA), and what to expect before, during and after an assessment. We look forward to building a better understanding with you. Remember your QA is available to answer questions any time, just call them or drop them an email.

Your QA will be asking what they can do to improve their approach, how they can improve their interactions with each team and how they can better support you. We appreciate your honest feedback, as it will guide us to serve you better.

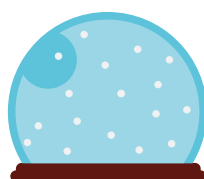

Early Childhood Education and Leadership Grant Programs

Do you qualify for the Ontario Early Childhood Educator Qualification Upgrade Program?



Did you know Ontario offers employed RECE leadership education grants in eligible fields of study?

Educators with six months of past or current experience working within a formal early learning program, licensed child care, and unlicensed home child care environment may qualify for financial support for tuition, travel and associated costs to complete an Early Childhood Educator (ECE) diploma (full-time and part-time) at an approved Ontario College for Applied Arts and Technology.

Currently employed RECEs with at least two years of experience may qualify for leadership education grants to cover part-time tuition costs in an eligible field of study at a recognized Ontario College for Applied Arts and Technology.

Individuals who identify as Francophone, First Nation, Métis or Inuit are exempt from the required two years of experience if currently employed with an eligible agency.

Individuals who identify as Francophone, First Nation, Métis or Inuit are exempt from the required six months work experience if they have a minimum of one day of employment within an eligible agency.

Eligible fields of study include:

- Pedagogical leadership in Early Childhood Education.
- Early Childhood Education administration and management.
- Facilities management.
- Financial management, responsibility and child care governance.
- Human resources, employment standards and labour relations.
